2016-2017 Focus on Globalization: Winter Term Events

This 2016-2017 academic year—the final year of a three-year series on Globalization—the Center for Global Education is sponsoring events and offering courses focused particularly on the "contested concept" of globalization. This term, four events are planned:

Children of Iraq, Children of Israel

Tuesday, January 24th, 7:30-9:00pm Smith Hall, Old Main

A look back to the 1950's when newly arrived Iraqi Jewish children were placed in Israeli transit camps and, despite adverse conditions, found ways to challenge and resist the state. This lecture depicts situations all too familiar to contemporary refugee children across the globe.

The Middle East & North Africa Since the Arab Spring of 2011

Wednesday, February 15th, 7:30-9:00pm Smith Hall, Old Main

This talk updates the politics of the MENA region, focusing on the Tunisian success story, the traumas of Egypt and Libya, the relative calm in Morocco and Algeria, the sectarian wars in Syria and Yemen--all in light of the volatile intersections of religion and politics, ISIS extremism, and the recent terrorist attacks in Europe and the U.S.

Exploring the Middle East in Chicago

Saturday, February 18th, 10:00am-8:00pm, (Students meet at Metra station at 10:00am)

This Verandah experience includes round-trip train transportation to Chicago, lunch at a MENA regional restaurant, a visit to the

Islamic Art collection in the Art Institute, and a dramatic reading, at Silk Road Rising Theatre, of "The Zionists," a play by Zohar Tirosh -Polk, exploring the effects of relocation, war, and loss on an Israeli family across multiple generations. All expenses are covered. To enroll, students must contact Prof. Tasdelen or Prof. Shindler by Friday, February 10, 2017.

Reel Bad Arabs: How Hollywood Vilifies a People

Wednesday, March 1, 7:30-9:00pm Smith Hall, Old Main

This 2006 documentary, directed by Sut Jhally and featuring author Jack Shaheen, traces the history of Hollywood's depiction of negative stereotypes of Arab people, analyzes these images, and attempts to explain the filmmakers' motivations.

English Language Institute (ELI)

In summer 2016 and fall 2016, the English Language Institute (ELI) continued to build on the momentum of the 2015-2016 academic year. The ELI hosted three summer programs, serving 30 students from 10 different countries. Course offerings included an eight-week academic term, a summer camp for high school students, and a three-week August Immersion program. Notably, the 8-week student population doubled in size from eight students in 2015 to 16 students in 2016. Many of the students joined the summer term to prepare for their undergraduate studies in the

fall. During the multiple programs, NCC students here hired as program counselors and gained valuable intercultural and leadership experience. Counselors primarily worked with ELI students by serving as resident assistants and activity guides.

In August, the ELI welcomed Graduate Assistant, Namiki Tanaka, to the team. Namiki hails from Japan, is a graduate of North Central, and has an interest in pursuing a career in international education. Namiki will assist with program outreach and communication and activity planning.

The fall 2016 class welcomed 21 full-time and part-time students from 13 different countries, a 16% increase in students served when compared to fall 2015.
