MENA Studies Minor Established at NCC

With the help of a two-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education, North Central College is pleased to be offering a minor in Middle Eastern and North African (MENA) Studies and to be launching language instruction in Arabic for the first time. The 21-credit minor includes nine credits in Arabic, a three-credit course in cultures of the region, and an additional nine credits chosen from art, conflict resolution, French, Gender and women's studies,

history, literature, music, political science or religious studies. The minor is presently co-directed by Dr. Esra Tasdelen, adjunct assistant professor of Arabic/MENA Studies and Dr. Jack Shindler, director, international program. Students in the minor will have opportunities to visit neighborhoods in Chicago, interact with local residents, and study abroad in Jordan or Turkey.

This academic year (2015-2016) there are 89 North Central College students participating in 29 semester, year-long, and SIROL study abroad programs in 17 countries. We have three students helping us launch our **brand new program** at Centre d'Études Franco-Américain de Management (CEFAM), an international business school, located in Lyon, France.

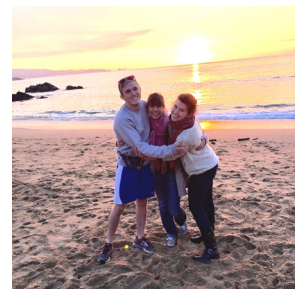
Eleven of our study abroad programs have internship opportunities and an additional four offer practicum, class-affiliated fieldwork, and research opportunities.

The ELI: Past, Present & Future

The English Language Institute (ELI) continued to grow through the summer and into the fall term. During the summer, the English Language Institute ran eight-week and four-week academic sessions for new and continuing ELI students. Eleven of the 13 students in the summer sessions continued into the fall as NCC undergraduates, exchange, ELI students in the fall term. The second annual ELI summer camp doubled in size and hosted 14 high school-aged students from China and Taiwan. To serve the incoming summer students, eight

NCC students were hired as counselors, who gained valuable intercultural and leadership experiences leading these students in activities and serving as their resident assistants.

The ELI is looking forward to continuing the momentum gained in the 2014-2015 academic year. The incoming fall 2015 class welcomed 14 full-time students and four part-time students from 13 different countries, a 33% increase in the fall student population from the previous year.

With a wide range of linguistic diversity,

the ELI staff are planning to reach out to Spanish, Arabic, and Chinese language classes to promote the Conversation Partner Program, which would enable American students to connect and practice their second language skills with a native speaker in the ELI.
